

Admission Information: Bachelor of Visual Art and Associate Degree of Visual Art

Bachelor of Visual Art

The Bachelor of Visual Art (BVA) is a three year degree program, designed to prepare students with the skills and knowledge to develop careers as practising artists. A focus on the fundamental art-making practices of drawing, painting and sculpture is complemented by an emphasis on art history and theory, conceptual development, and professional practice. At Level 3 students are supported to develop a coherent body of work based on comprehensive, self-directed, studio research.

On completion of the BVA, graduates are equipped to develop an independent studio practice and pursue a career as a professional practising artist. Graduates are also well positioned to undertake further study or pursue employment opportunities in related fields, such as arts administration, arts writing, education, marketing and events, commercial design, and curating.

Associate Degree of Visual Art

The Associate Degree of Visual Art (ADVA) is a two-year entry level program focused on building foundation skills in key aspects of visual art. The ADVA offers an exit point from the BVA, enabling students who have completed Level 1 and 2 to graduate with a stand-alone qualification. On completion of the ADVA, graduates are equipped to pursue employment opportunities in the field of visual arts and in related occupations, or undertake further study.

Admission Criteria

General Entry Principles

Adelaide Central School of Art (the School) will admit suitably qualified school-leavers and mature-age students to the ADVA and BVA. In doing so, the School will:

- Consider both academic factors and non-academic factors in making decisions about whether to accept applicants into the ADVA or BVA, including portfolio interviews and applications for Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL);
- Treat all applicants in a fair and equitable manner;
- Seek to ensure that each applicant accepted into the ADVA or BVA will have a good chance of completing the course successfully.

Academic Entry Requirements

- Satisfactory completion of the South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE) with a minimum ATAR score of 60 (or the equivalent certificate and score from an Australian secondary school) OR
- Satisfactory completion of the International Baccalaureate Diploma OR
- Attainment of a Higher Education gualification of AQF Level 5 or above within the last 10 years

Alternative Entry Requirements

Alternative Entry applications are assessed on the basis of the criteria listed below PLUS a portfolio interview.

- Attainment of Higher Education qualification of AQF Level 5 or above more than 10 years ago
- Completion or partial completion of a recognised higher education program at a recognised higher education institution OR
- Successful completion of the South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE) with an ATAR score below 60 (or the equivalent certificate) OR
- Completion of a recognised TAFE Certificate IV, Diploma or Associate Diploma OR
- Completion of a recognised Foundation Studies Program, OR
- Previous visual art study or practice

Additional information

Australian citizens or permanent residents with overseas qualifications

Overseas qualifications will be assessed for equivalence to the Academic Entry Requirements. If equivalence is not established, the applicant will be processed under the Alternative Entry Requirements.

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander (ATSI) people

There is currently no separate admissions process for ATSI people.

International applicants

The School is not registered to accept international students.

Special consideration due to disability, illness or family disruption

Applicants that do not meet the academic entry requirements are eligible to apply under the alternative entry stream and undertake a portfolio interview. The assessment panel for alternative entry applicants will consider disability, illness or family disruption. Applicants can raise factors for special consideration directly with the Student Liaison Officer when lodging an application or with the assessment panel during the portfolio interview.

Applicants with disabilities

In addition to the processes outlined above, the School is committed to meeting its obligations outlined in the *Disability Standards for Education 2005 (the Standards)*. The Standards require educators to make 'reasonable adjustments' to ensure that students with disabilities are treated on the same basis as students without disabilities. How to Apply

For admission into the BVA, applicants are required to submit the New Student Application Form, supporting documentation, and a 300 word exhibition review. Please refer to the New Student Application Form for further information.

Applications must be submitted by the prescribed due date.

Applicants who do not meet the academic entry requirements are invited to attend a portfolio interview with the Academic Administration Manager and one to two academic staff members.

Applicants are notified of the outcome of their application by post. Applicants who are accepted into a course of study receive a Letter of Offer and Enrolment Pack. Applicants who are not accepted into a course of study receive written notification.

Late applications incur a fee as detailed in the New Student Application Form. The School reserves the right not to accept late applications.

Applicants who are dissatisfied with the outcome of their application are referred to the School's <u>Student</u> Grievance Policy and Procedures, available on the School's website.

Enrolment

Successful applicants will be required to complete the New Student Enrolment Form, which will be enclosed in the Enrolment Pack. At this stage, successful applicants will be required to make their unit selection, select a payment option, and agree to the Terms & Conditions of Enrolment.
